For the 2024 / 2025 season, ASWA made a significant investment across all areas of our sport. Our progress reflecting the dedication, teamwork, and passion of our athletes, coaches, volunteers, and Board members.

This year, the ASWA team, headed by our High-Performance Manager, Brian Miller, has continued to drive excellence across participation, performance, and administration. We were delighted to welcome Benedetta Alderighi (High Performance Coach), Maitane Iglesias Vázquez (Club Coach and Administration), and, most recently, Suzie Vieira as our new General Manager, who brings strong strategic leadership and governance experience to the organisation.

We also extend our thanks and best wishes to Shoko Ono and Camille Claudino, who concluded their roles this season. Shoko made a significant impact by upskilling our coaches and judges, contributing greatly to the overall development of our programs. Camille, in her role as Development Officer, worked diligently to expand participation through the AquaStART and regional programs, fosterina sustainable community connections across Western Australia.

Emily Rogers departed in February to begin an internship with World Aquatics, a wonderful achievement that highlights the calibre of individuals within our community.

Thanks to a grant from DLGSC, Rose Stackpole transitioned to a new role as Welfare Officer at the Hancock Prospecting Centre of Excellence. Rose remains a valued member of our WA community, continuing to coach at the club level and lead the development of our technical controllers.

Amie Thompson continued her outstanding work within our High-Performance Program, spending time in Broome and successfully establishing an AquaStART Centre there. Amie will relocate to Broome next year to continue growing Artistic Swimming in the Pilbara region, helping to expand our sport's reach in northern WA.



Our High-Performance team, Mary Andreotta, Brian, Bene, and Amie, have collaborated closely to deliver strong programs for WA athletes this season, building momentum as we move toward Brisbane 2032.

We continue to see great success across the regions. The Southern Swans in Mandurah continue to flourish, while our newest club, Kwilena Artistic Swimming Club in Bunbury, has been officially established, another exciting milestone for regional Artistic Swimming in Western Australia. Growth and Membership

This year, we witnessed amazing growth in the sport of Artistic Swimming across Western Australia. ATHLETE PATHWAY


The AquaStART Athlete Development Pathway provides a clear progression for develop their swimmers to artistic first-time skills from swimming participants to elite athletes. It begins with AquaStART, an introduction to Artistic Swimming through fun, engaging programs delivered in schools community settings, including Aqua Beginner, Aqua Intermediate, and Before School Synchro sessions.

As swimmers build confidence, they advance through the Beginner, Intermediate, and Advanced stages, achieving their first Star levels and performing at State events. From there, athletes move into the structured Aqua Basics (Stars 3–5) and Aqua Pro (Stars 7–9) levels, training around five hours per week and grouped by age.

Swimmers can then choose between State Stream, which focuses on skills development and State-level competition, or the National Stream, which offers a competitive pathway for 10 & Under, 12 & Under, Youth, Junior, and Senior athletes. leading opportunities national for and international representation. The High Performance level represents pinnacle of this pathway, where athletes train intensively toward international competition as part of the National Team.

For those wishing to stay active and connected, the Masters Program offers both competitive and non-competitive options for adults aged 18 and over, promoting the philosophy of "Artistic Swimming for Life." Across all stages, the pathway supports participation, skill progression, and a lifelong love of artistic swimming.

PARTICIPATION & REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT

The 2024–2025 season has marked another exciting chapter for our participation programs across Western Australia.

Our ongoing partnership with Royal Life Saving Society WA and the AquaStART initiative continue to play a key role in developing grassroots Artistic Swimming. Artistic Swimming WA (ASWA) currently regional supports five centers. Mandurah, Rockingham, Donnybrook, delivering Broome. Bunbury and successful come and try sessions, and regional camps throughout the year.

This season has seen outstanding participation from schools across the Perth Metropolitan area, with growing interest and engagement.

We've had the pleasure of working with schools whose students several embraced the sport with enthusiasm and commitment: St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls, Churchlands Senior High School, All Saints' College, Carine Senior High School, St Mary's Anglican Girls' School, with a highlight from IONA Presentation College accruina an impressive 155 participants.

Overall, we have exceeded our target participation goal of 3000 by 174.27%, with a total of 5228 athletes involved throughout the season.

We are incredibly grateful to our sponsors for their continued support, and immensely proud of the coaches, athletes, students, parents, teachers, schools and volunteers whose dedication fuels the growth of our sport.













HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAM





This season, our High Performance Pathway program featured 11 athletes including Robyn, Chloe, Serena, Bianca, Maya, Leslie, Charlotte, Yolanda, Isabella, Elvira, and Anika, led by coaches Benedetta Alderighi, Shoko Ono, and Amie Thompson.

The season began with a three-day camp in Busselton, joined by Italian acrobatics specialist Aldo Pantaloeni, which set the tone for a year of growth and skill development. Throughout the season, athletes trained weekly and attended monthly High Performance Camps, supported by experts including Tony Ally (Diving), Clair Voss (Pilates and Ballet), and Giorgio Minisini (Artistic Swimming World Champion).

The Youth Squad focused on preparation for the World Championships in August 2025, while the Junior Squad aimed for selection into the Green and Gold Academy Camp in Canberra.

Overall, the season was highly successful, with strong attendance, visible technical and artistic improvement, and positive feedback from athletes and coaches. The program continues to strengthen WA's pathway to national and international success.








This year, we continued to see a steady increase in participation, with an average of 80 athletes per competition showing the growing interest and commitment within our community.

JUDGING COORDINATOR'S REPORT



Another season has flown by with much accomplished. We have maintained our judge cohort with three shadow judges and 8 full judges. The coaches are still working with us in judging the figures and doing a fabulous job. The new judging system is still evolving with lots of new things for us to learn as we moved through the season.

We had Jenny Gray visit us again for the states and she held a few sessions for the judges which are always fun and informative. Her knowledge of the sport is endless, and she can teach us all so much, coaches and judges alike.

The focus of the season for the judges was transitions: what they are and how to mark them. They are basically all the bits between the hybrids, where the athletes' heads are up and they are breathing.

These movements tie the whole routine together and have their own score in the new system under the Artistic Impression panel. These movements start with the deck work (yes this is now getting marked) and finishes with the music. The coaches can really let their choreography work here to convey the theme of the routine and earn some good points. There were a few routines at the National competition in Melbourne that showcased of the the importance transitions, and the difference good and interesting transitions can make to the routine score.

Nationals was a great end to our season with many WA routines on show. We had four judges travel to Melbourne this year and they were evaluated by Andida from The Netherlands. She was a fabulous evaluator and teacher. She also spent a fair bit of time discussing transitions with the judges and coaches.

Our new season is just starting and promises to be another challenging yet fulfilling year with lots of laughter and learning in the judge room. Again, remember that anyone who would like to see what it is we do you are always welcome to pop in and have a chat.

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987.

The financial report covers SYNCHRO WA INCORPORATED as an individual entity.

INCORPORATED is an association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Income tax

The Incorporation is self assessed as a Not for Profit organisation and therefore exempt from Income Tax

a) Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction. It is a policy of SYNCHRO WA INCORPORATED to have an independent valuation every three years, with annual appraisals being made by the directors.

The revaluation of freehold land and buildings has not taken account of the potential capital gains tax on assets acquired after the introduction of capital gains tax.

b)Plant and equipment

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

c) Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised leased assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to SYNCHRO WA INCORPORATED commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Properties held for investment purposes are not subject to a depreciation charge. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking in to account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established. Dividends

received from associates and joint venture entities are accounted for in accordance with the equity method of accounting.


